

<u>Seasonal Notes October-November 2024</u> <u>by Alex Bennett - Spring care</u>

Spring is a temperamental time of the year with hot sunny days followed cold, wet and windy periods. With these fluctuations, special care needs to be taken to protect any new growth from damage. Sometimes you could get heatwaves with short bursts of heated air. Adequate water must be provided to ensure that trees do not dry out.

New growth is developing fast and is very soft with little tolerance to water and heat stress. For the bonsai beginners, take note, this time of the year is the MOST dangerous time for you regarding watering.

In relation to the excess heat we have been receiving, some caution needs to be taken to ensure the tree is in fresh soil. So please complete all your reporting. Sometimes when a tree is root bound the roots can block the drainage holes, so the excess water can be blocked up.

Another thing to be aware of is the growth cycle. In early spring the foliage grows first; from mid to late spring the roots start growing. So it essential the repotting you have to do needs to be done now, particularly non-native Bonsai. So I would recommend a regular fertiliser regime to keep the trees' strength up prior to repotting and afterwards.

Repotting

Most deciduous trees should now be repotted. The native trees including Banksias and Figs are commonly repotted now and into late spring.

Pines and conifers should be finished by this time of year. These trees can still be wired but I do not recommend heavy cutting followed up by wiring then a repot all at once. Avoid pruning the roots on pines if the candles are producing needles.

Evergreen flowering trees such as Azaleas and Gardenias are best repotted as soon as they have finished flowering. Remember to start your fertilising as soon as they have finished flowering.

Rotate your trees every couple of weeks, so all sides can get full exposure and even growth.

Cut back any long shoots thrown out by deciduous trees. Check wiring to make sure that it is not cutting into the

Your fertilising schedule should now be at its peak to support new spring growth. It is suggested that each fortnight you use a complete fertiliser at normal strength with an added boost of seaweed extract such as Seasol®. You can pour the fertiliser on the foliage and roots. Pay attention to any trees that were repotted last Autumn or in Winter as their needs will be greatest.

I use Charlie carp®, Aminogro®, Nitrosol®, Seasol's Powerfeed®, Fish emulsion brands, Vitarich®, Thrive®. Bio-guano®, these products I sell at my nursery. You can apply one of these fertilisers with Go Go juice, Seasol or other seaweed concentrates. This product is not a fertiliser. However you do not to want to mix the fertilisers. A lot of fertilisers on the market don't show they are a two in one fertiliser. So please read the label both front and back to verify.

Pest and disease

Remember pests and fungus can become very active this time of year. Ensure you look closely on your leaves both on top and underside. Unexplained yellowing, weak growth and leaf drop is a sign you should have a closer look. Thankfully the pests that attack your trees are not rare or exotic so treating them is pretty straight forward.

Scale – Eco oil® is fine to use, Yates® Scale gun and also Eco Neem® oil. These will need to be diluted with water. Scale gun is already premixed. Pest oil and white oil can premixed but may have unpredictable results with certain trees. You can test spray an area on the tree if unsure. Follow up spraying may be necessary. If unsure speak to a qualified Horticulturist.

Aphids - Contendor® insect spray and most other pesticides will be fine to use.

Look always at the underside of the leaves and at the tips. Look for tiny ugly brown and black bugs that distort and shrivel the new growth. Some trees may have webbing, these are spiders that are attracted to the aphids. But spiders are apex predators they are hunting bugs and are not trying to eat your tree.

Caterpillars - Pyrethrum and Conguard® insect spray may be fine to use though picking off the bugs may be all that is needed.

Curl grub/Cut worm and Mealy bugs in the roots - Only noticeable at time of repotting remember to remove them from soil site when observed. You may use Richgro® Bug Killa, Eco neem oil.

Thrips - Leaf curling may be the most noticeable on your figs. No need to spray. Pluck infected leaves with finger. I like to use a Confidor® tablet.

Mites - specific Miticides i.e Mancozeb® and Eco-Neem oil seem to work best. Though follow up sprays may be required. These are the most common pests that you will see.

Black sooty mould - usually an indicator of either scale or Aphids and poor location to sunlight. Powdery mildew usually affects colder climate evergreen and deciduous trees. Causation is related to poor watering and fertilising practice. These are the more common fungi.

I like to use Liquid copper or Eco fungicide mixed with Eco

Root rot may also be common for trees' root systems usually caused by overzealous watering and not repotting in a timely matter. Usual signs are blackened soil; blackening of trunk and or branches and leaves wilting due to soil having no air to exchange with the leaves.

Pruning

With the rapid spring growth, it is a good time to observe your trees, notice areas of strong growth and weak growth areas. These observations can be used to start correcting any errors in the structure of your trees or to suggest, some restyling.

Break the candles on your Red and Black pines with your fingers never use scissors. Needle pluck Pines to remove last year's needles, this will allow sun into the new growth. This will encourage new shoots.

Remove all spent flowers on Azaleas by carefully snipping the flower stalk. That will remove the developing seed capsule which will use a lot of energy and nutrients that the tree would otherwise use for new growth.





Alex's repotting demonstration at the Garden Gallery

Alex demonstrated how to repot a bonsai for the audience at the Garden Gallery.

He began by pruning and styling his tree first and then wired some of the branches. Next he removed the tree from the pot, then prepared the same pot ready for the tree to be replanted.

He fixed pieces of mesh over the drainage holes using a short piece of wire to hold the mesh in place and then used two pieces of 1.5 mm wire fitted through the drainage holes and extending past the rim of the pot so the tree can be secured to the pot. Alex removed the old soil from the tree and then

Alex removed the old soil from the tree and then held the plant upright so he could cut the excess growth of old roots, leaving just enough to promote new root growth.

With the help of Galen he then placed small pebbles over the drainage holes in the pot to prevent the bonsai soil mix from clogging the mesh holes.

He only placed enough soil in a neat mound to accommodate the bonsai and then determined the best position where the tree should sit in the pot.

Next he attached the two wires and tied them securely making sure the tree would not move. He then added more soil to the pot and he and Galen began to tamp down and press the new soil making sure there were no air pockets left in the soil.

After finishing pressing down the soil he then smoothed the soil out making it even and finishing just below the rim of the pot. Job done.


