I hope that we can all continue to share and help one another so we can learn more about this fascinating art form.

On behalf of our members, I would like to thank the Nesci family who have accommodated our presence every month so we can advance in our knowledge of suiseki. Every month Rose has made special hot 'rock cakes' for us on our arrival to get us started, especially on those cold winter mornings! This is a great way of catching up on the news from our members from far and wide. So, thank you to the Nesci family for all that you have done for us over the past year.

Last weekend we put on a suiseki display at the School of Bonsai Show (of which we are affiliated with), and it was a huge success with a 'difference'. I thought of the idea to showcase Australian stones, but not in the traditional way of displaying. It was a gamble, but from the public opinions that we got, it was very, very successful!! I wanted to display our Australian stones as we would find them out in the outback. Small sandbags were placed under ocre coloured material to imitate the undulating surface of the outback and then our stones were placed accordingly (with no daizas)!! There were a few small Australian animals, a homestead, and some aboriginal people gatherings to complete the picture. Amazingly, the children (and even their parents) found it compelling, and they loved the small scenes that we created.

Another addition to the show, I thought of, was that we all have those obsolete small stones that we collected over the years but are not suitable suiseki material, so I told the members to wrap them up in pretty paper and we would give them out as FREE lucky dips for the children. Well, to our surprise on the **first day** they were all gone by morning teatime and the children absolutely loved them. We told them that they would be their 'lucky stone', so they must look after them. One little girl kissed her stone when she opened the wrapping paper!! I then had to rally the troops again to bring some more in for the next day. Surprise, surprise again they were all gone again by morning tea break!! I hope that in the future those children will be future stone collectors and get into suiseki!!!!

Another surprise that we had on the weekend was that a professional man attended and took a video of our display, and he was utterly intrigued with it.
