<u>WHAT'S NEW AT SHIBUI</u>

Jan-Feb at Shibui Bonsai

Monitor watering is the primary task at Shibui Bonsai in Summer. Long, hot, dry days mean the trees need to transpire lots of water to stay cool and hydrated. That water must come from the pot or soil so it's important to make sure trees are properly watered. Hurried or inadequate watering means only the surface is wet while deeper in the pot it's still dry. This, in turn means the tree won't have enough water for the next hot day.

If a pot is dry, either soak it in a tub for at least 10 minutes to allow the dry potting mix to absorb water OR water copiously at least 3 times with a few minutes between each watering to allow the water to soak into the root ball.

Trees that have not been repotted for a few years will have filled the pot with roots leaving less and less space for vital water. If you have trees that wilt each day despite plenty of water, sit the pots on a gravel tray or even in a shallow tray of water during hot weather. The extra water can mean the difference between surviving or dying.

The rapid Spring growth is slowing now but Lengthening branches can still be trimmed as often as required. Sometimes it is good to let branches on developing trees grow without trimming for up to a year. The extra growth and leaves will help speed up thickening if that's what you need.





I have many trees where the apex is well developed but some lower branches are still a little thin. In this case, trim top shoots regularly but allow shoots on the thinner branches to grow longer to add some strength and thickness to those thinner branches.



Above: a cluster of 8 branches growing from one node. The area is already thicker than the trunk below.

Right: After pruning to remove excess branches. That's a pretty ugly job. If it doesn't heal well the tree can be chopped to a lower branch. Check Japanese maples for clusters of shoots, especially after pruning. Clusters of shoots growing close together can quickly produce inverse taper so thin out unnecessary shoots as soon as possible. Trident maples can also send up strong shoots from the trunk or from lower branches. Often they grow unnoticed, hidden by outer foliage so check inside the canopy regularly to catch these before they create unwanted thickening.



Pines that were pruned or decandled in December should now have lots of new buds opening. Let those new shoots grow until Autumn.

Nutrients are important to maintain good growth and tree health. Regular, heavy watering leaches soluble nutrients out of the pots so it is important to keep replacing lost nutrients by regularly fertilising. Solid fertilisers can release nutrients for 3-6 weeks so add a little more every month through the growing season. Liquid fertiliser has mostly water soluble nutrients which are leached away quicker so use liquid fert every 2-3 weeks. Controlled release fertilisers have a polymer coating that only allows a little nutrient to escape when there's water around the prills so they can keep feeding your trees for 3-9 months depending on the coating.
